He was for some years a Churchwarden and Guardian of the Poor of this Parish, and Chairman of the Local Board of Health. The Western light of the Bishops' window was given in his memory by his sons and daughters.

THE central light
of the Bishops' window
depicts William of
Wykeham, and was
given by the architect
of this church, some-
time a member of
New College, Oxford.

**EDWARD RICHARD
NORTHEY.**

The
Easternmost window
in the South aisle was

given by Edward Wm
Northey. Priest, late
Vicar of Chaddesden,
Derbyshire, of Wood-
cote House, Epsom and
Box, Wiltshire in mem-
ory of his Father, Ed^w
Richard Northey of
Woodcote House, Epsom,
and Box, Wiltshire,
who was born February
8th 1795. He married

in 1828 Charlotte Isabella,
daughter of Sir George
Anson. G. C. B., and by
her had seven children.
She died in January,
1842. He married again
in 1844, Louisa, daughter
of Rev: R. Hesketh, of
Epsom. Mr Northey
served in the 52nd Regt^t
of Light Infantry in Spain
and South of France

and was present at the
Battle of Waterloo. He
was wounded at the
Battle of Vittoria and
invalided home, when
he lived at Woodcote.
He was Deputy Lieut for
the County of Surrey,
and High Sheriff in 1836:
Chairman of the Epsom
Bench of Magistrates
and the School Managers.

Mr Northey died at the age of 83, having spent most of his long life in doing as much good as possible for the inhabitants of Epsom, and was succeeded by his eldest son, Edward William Northey, Priest. His third son, Francis Vernon, Lt. Col: 60th Rifles, was killed in the Battle of

Gingilova, South Africa,
April. 2nd 1879.

**FOTHERGILL REX
ELDERTON.** The
Sanctuary Lamp was
given in proud and lov-
-ing memory of Lieut:
Fothergill Rex (Benny)
Elderton, the only and
very dearly loved son
of Charles Robert and
Clara Hunton Elderton

of Pendoylon, Epsom_.
He was educated at
Matfield Grange, Kent,
Epsom College, and the
College of Engineering,
Kensington (Lond: Univ:).
He joined H.M. Forces
on Sept. 12th 1914, and
served with the 2nd Bn,
Royal Warwickshire Regt
taking part in the batt-
les of Neuve Chappelle,

Aubers Ridge, La Bassée,
and Festubert, and was
killed at Loos on Sept.
25th 1915, in his 24th year.
He was mentioned in
Despatches for gallant
and distinguished ser-
vice in the field.

THOMAS TOWNS-
END BUCKNILL.

The candlesticks on the
High Altar were given by

Dame Annie Bell Bucknill
in memory of her husband
The Rt.Hon. Sir Thomas
Townsend Bucknill, who
was born April 18th 1845,
and who died October
4th 1915. From 1885 to 1899
he was Recorder of
Exeter, and from 1892 to
1899 M.P. for the Epsom
division of Surrey.
Sir Thomas was a Judge

of the High Court of
Justice from 1899 to 1914
and he was then made a
Privy Councillor for his
services. From 1903 to
1915 he was Provincial
Grand Master of Surrey.
During his 33 years res-
-idence in Epsom he
associated himself with
and was deeply inter-
-ested in Epsom and

the neighbourhood.
He was a member of
the Re-building Com-
-mittee and a sides-
-man of the church
from 1904 - 1914.

1914-1919



n the pages which follow are short records of one hundred and six men of the parish of St. Martin, Epsom, who fell in battle or died from wounds, or sickness in the Great War.

The Memorial Tablet on the North Wall of the Church tells their Names and Regiments and the Year and order of their death.

Twelve of their number were Sailors or Soldiers by profession, the others left home and calling, and those who held them dear, to join the Nation's Forces in the hour of her utmost need.

For their loyalty and the great sacrifice they made all are held in honour, and their memory is gratefully cherished, and handed down to those who shall follow after.

"Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends."

WILLIAM GUY ALDRIDGE, was drowned at sea on the 4th. May 1917, on the way to Egypt in the Transport "Pennsylvania".

FRANK ARTHUR, was wounded at Delville Wood and died on 3rd. September 1916. He was buried at Mericourt.

His elder brother **FREDERICK ARTHUR**, for three years a prisoner of war in Bulgaria, after his release, died of Malaria at Salonica on the 24th. October 1918.

FRANCIS JOHN BAILEY, was killed in action in France on 22nd. November 1917.

His brother **WILLIAM HENRY BAILEY**, was also killed in action at Queudecourt in France on the 10th. October 1916. Both were in the Church Lads Brigade and **WILLIAM**, when a boy was in the choir of St. Johns Church.

CHARLES BALLINGER died of pneumonia at Winchester on the 23rd. May 1916.

ALBERT HENRY BEAMS, was killed in action on the first July 1916. at the Battle of the Somme and was buried in front of Gommecourt Wood.

ALBERT EDWARD BLACKMA was killed in action in France on the 23rd. July 1916.

PERCIVAL WALTER BONE, died while a prisoner of war at Gustrow, July-August 1918.

ERNEST EDWARD BOTTING, died of sunstroke at Delhi on the 30th. June 1916.

GEORGE OLIVER JAMES BREEDEN, was killed in action at Beaumont-Hammel on the 17th. November 1916.

ALBERT WILLIAM BROUGHTON, was reported wounded and missing and presumed died of wounds in France on the 25th. September 1915.

ERNEST BUDD, was killed in action in France on the 8th. October 1916.

THOMAS HENRY BURFITT, was reported wounded and missing and presumed died of wounds in France 1st. July 1916.

JOHN PHILIP HENRY BUTCHER, was killed in action at Vimy Ridge near Arras on 21st. or 22nd. May. 1916.

JOHN STANLEY CHADBAND, was wounded and died in Hospital at Bethune 31st. December 1915.

ALBERT CHALWIN, whilst in Service in France he contracted influenza and died at Rouen on the 20th. November 1918. He was buried there.

ARTHUR GEORGE CHITTENDEN, was killed in action on 21st. August 1917. at Armentières.

ALBERT WALTER CHONEY, was wounded and missing in Belgium and presumed killed in action 26th October 1916. He was awarded the Military Medal.

His brother **WILLIAM GEORGE CHONEY**, was in the army at the outbreak of the war. He died a prisoner in Germany on the 16th November 1914, from wounds received in action.

CHRISTOFER ALBON CLAPHAM, was killed in action near Fleurbaix on the 10th February 1916.

THOMAS GEORGE COLLIER, was killed in action in the "Ypres-Salient" on the 21st September 1917.

PERCY JESSE COOKE, was killed in action at Gallipoli on the 10th May 1915.

WALTER HENRY COOKE, was killed in action near Carnoy on the 1st July 1916.

WILLIAM EUGENE COULSON, who was in the Royal Air Force died 5th September 1919 as the result of an accident while flying from Cologne. He had been a prisoner of war in 1918. Before enlisting ^{he} was a boy Scout in Epsom.

FRANK ERNEST COX, was killed in action in France 27th September 1918.

TREFELYN ROLAND CROPLEY, was killed in action near Cambrai on the 30th November 1917.

ARTHUR CULVER, died at Rouen on the 29th March 1918 from wounds received in action.

HENRY ALLAN CUMMING, was killed by a shell at Pozieres Wood in France on 29th July 1916. When war broke out he was in Australia, and he joined the Australian Imperial Force.

JOHN KNIGHTLEY DONHUE, was only 16 years of age in the year 1914 when he, his father and three brothers all joined the Army. He was reported missing during the first advance on the Somme, and was officially presumed killed in action on the 1st July 1916.

FOTHERGILL REX ELDERTON, whose career is recorded in earlier pages of this book was killed at Loos on the 25th Sept 1915. He was mentioned in dispatches.

SAMUEL GEORGE ELEY, was killed in action in France on the 19th July 1918. He had been a boy Scout and a member of the Epsom Rifle Club.

WILLIAM HERBERT ELLIOT, On the 2nd March 1917, he was wounded at Ypres and died on the same day. He was buried in Bailleul Military Cemetery.

WILLIAM GEORGE ENGLAND, was killed in action in France on the 28th January 1916.

FREDERICK PERCY ENGLISH, was killed in action in France on the 20th July 1916.

EDWARD FRIDAY, was killed in action in France on the 3rd September 1916.

STEWART ARKCOLL GABRIEL, was killed by an enemy bomb while lying gassed in a Casualty Clearing Station at Poperinghe on the 21st August 1917.

FRED MASON GALYER, died of wounds in France on the 7th June 1917.

WILLIAM NORMAN GARDINER, was a Naval Officer at the outbreak of the war and was killed in action at the Battle of Jutland on the 31st May 1916.

DAVID LYNDSEY STRANACK GASKELL, was killed in action in France on the 12th January 1916.

ARCHER EDWARD GOBLE, was killed in action in France on the 1st June 1918.

FRED GOREY, was gassed in France and died at Cardiff on the 5th September 1918. He was buried in Epsom Cemetery.

His brother **HENRY GOREY**, also died of gas poisoning in France on the 19th May 1918, and was buried in St. Sevre Cemetery, Rouen.

GORDON HARLEY GRELLIER, was killed in action on 31st October 1918 at Poix du Nord where he was buried. His home during nearly the whole of his life was in Epsom where he was born ^{and} school. He was a Sidesman of this Church.

HUMPHREY HALGRIM GRUNDTVIG, was mortally wounded in action and died the next day, 22nd March 1918, at Grévillers where he was buried. He was awarded the Military Cross.

MARTIN SIDNEY THOMAS HAIRS, was reported missing at Armentières and was officially presumed to have been killed in action on the 9th April 1918.

ALFRED STANLEY HARKNETT, was killed in action on the 15th September 1916, and was buried in Delville Wood Cem'y.

His younger brother **ARTHUR SIDNEY HARKNETT**, was wounded and died in the Casualty Clearing Station and Pernes on the 7th August 1918.

CLEMENT HARVEY, was gassed while on active service in France and died in Horton Hospital, Epsom, on the 4th June 1918.

RONALD DENNE HEWITT, was killed in action on the 7th July 1916 during the battle of the Somme.

GEORGE HYDE, had been in the Army and had retired - but at the outbreak of the War, in 1914, he re-enlisted. He died at home, on the 27th December 1917, of illness contracted on War service in France.

ARTHUR JAMES JACKSON, was in the Army when war was declared and was killed in action in France on the 1st April 1915.

JOHN WARINGTON JEAL, died in France of wounds on the 8th October 1918.

JAMES REED JENKINS, was in the Navy before the war. He was drowned at Sea on Good Friday, 29th March 1918, when his ship struck a mine.

BERNARD KEITH JOHNSON, was killed in action on the Somme on the 1st July 1916.

JOHN WILLIAM JOHNSON, was in the Navy before the War. He died at home, on the 4th November 1919, of illness contracted on active service.

TOM DONOVAN JOLLIFFÉ, after serving in the Territorial Force he joined the Regular Army in 1911. He was missing at Ypres and officially presumed killed in action on the 17th February 1915.

ARCHIBALD FRANK PERCIVAL JONES, was an Army reservist and on the declaration of War he was recalled to the Colours. He was killed in action, in the retreat from Mons, on 7th September 1914.

HORACE STANLEY KNIGHT, was killed in action at Ypres on 24th June 1917.

FREDERICK CHARLES LAMBERT, was reported missing and was officially presumed to have been killed in action in France on 23rd July 1916.

ROBERT JOHN LEDGER, died on 11th March 1917, from wounds received while acting as Brigade Bombing Officer at practice at Avesnes le Comte.

JOHN MARSON, was killed in action at Ypres on 12th October 1917.

ALBERT MASKELL, was reported missing on 30th Sept 1915 after the battle at Loos, and officially presumed dead.

ALBERT EDWARD MASKELL, after 21 years service in the Army, the latter part of the time in France, died in Park Gates Hospital, Chester, on the 8th April 1917 of illness contracted on active service. He was a son of John Maskell, for many years Verger of this Church.

PERCY STANLEY MASON, was born in Epsom and went to Canada in 1912. He joined the Canadian Mounted Rifles when war broke out and was killed in action in France on 28th September 1916.

ALBERT MASSEY, died of Influenza at a Casualty Clearing Station at Maubeuge on 9th December 1918. He received the Distinguished Conduct Medal 1916.

WILFRED E. MAUVAN, took part in the operations at Subla Bay, Gallipoli, was reported missing and was officially presumed killed on 8th August 1915. He was an Assistant Master at the Church of England Boys School and taught in the Church Sunday School.

ERIC DUNFEE MEREDITH, was killed in action in France on the 7th October 1916.

ALFRED MIDDLETON, was killed in action in France on 17th July 1917.

FREDERICK JOHN MOORCROFT, was killed in action in France on 3rd August 1917.

GEORGE STANLEY NASH, was killed in action in France on 10th March 1915.

WILLIAM HENRY NEVES, was killed in action at Cambrai on 23rd March 1918.

RAYMOND NORRINGTON, was killed in action at Hooze in Belgium on 16th August 1917.

MAJOR WILLIAM NORTHEY, D.S.O. was in the Army before the war. He died in Hospital at Boulogne, on the 18th October 1914, of wounds received during the retreat from Mons. He was the fourth son of the Rev Edward William Northey of Woodcote House, Epsom.

ALBERT OCKENDEN, died in France of wounds on 27th September 1916.

JOHN EDWARD PALMER, was reported missing and officially presumed killed in France in May 1918.

His brother **THOMAS PALMER**, died of wounds in France on 9th October 1917.

CHARLES ARTHUR MATTHEWS PIPER, was killed in action in Belgium on 13th May 1915.

FREDERICK PLUME, died in Hospital of pneumonia contracted on active service in France 6th November 1918.

GEORGE SIDNEY PORTT, was wounded and died in Hospital at Wimereux on 20th August 1918.

WILLIAM PYE, was wounded and died in Hospital at Rouen on 29th June 1915.

LEONARD HAROLD RATCLIFF, was killed in action at Gallipoli on 9th August 1915.

HENRY ROBINSON, died while a prisoner of war in October 1918. and was buried in the Cemetery at Gouvy.

ALFRED HENRY SARGENT, was killed in action at Loos on 25th September 1915.

WALTER PERCY SCOTT, was killed in action in Delville Wood on the 27th July 1917.

THOMAS SHEPPARD, died in Germany on the 19th May 1917, from wounds received in the battle of Arras.

OLIVER JOHN SHRUBB, was killed in action in France on the 3rd August 1917.

JAMES ALEXANDER SMITH, of 16 Victoria Place was reported missing in France 27th-29th May 1918.

LEONARD CECIL SMITH, of Waterloo Road was reported missing in France and presumed killed on the 26th October 1917.

PERCIVAL ROBERT SMITH, of 1, Ivy Terrace, South Street, was killed in action in Belgium on the 30th July 1917.

GORDON STEVENS, was wounded in France and died in Hospital at Tincourt on 7th October 1918.

ALFRED GEORGE STEVENSON, was wounded in France and died at a Casualty Clearing Station on the 27th September 1917.

GEORGE STURGESS, was reported missing near Arras and was officially presumed killed in action on the 8th May 1917.

RÉGINALD PHILIP STURT, was in the Army before the War and was wounded at Ypres on the 1st November 1914. He died at Home of Pthisis on the 21st June 1917.

ALFRED TERRY, was killed in action at Ypres on the 12th July 1917.

JOSEPH EDWARD TOMS, was reported missing near Arras and officially presumed killed in action on 3rd May 1917.

GEORGE TRACEY, was taken prisoner at Arras and died two days later on 10th May 1917. He was awarded the Military Medal.

WALTER GUY TYE, was killed in action in France on the 29th April 1918.

WILLIAM MORRIS VINCENT, of the Suffolk Regiment was attached to the 4th Battalion Essex Regiment in Palestine, and in the first attack on Gaza, on the 26th March 1917, he was killed in action.

ARCHIE KENNETH WATKINS, was killed in action in France on 1st November 1918. He had previously been twice wounded. As a boy he was in the Choir of this Church.

JOE ERNEST JOHN WHEELER, was killed in action at Ypres on 6th October 1917.

WILLIAM LEONARD WHEELER, was in the Royal Navy and in H.M.S. "Bulwark" at Chatham when, on 26th November 1914, she blew up and he was killed.

CHARLES WHITE, was wounded on 16th August 1916, in the battle on the Somme and died four days later of his wounds on the 20th August 1916.

JOHN STANLEY WICKENS, was killed in action at Montecourt on 17th October 1918, and was buried in St. Aubrits British Cemetery in France. He was for nine years a chorister at St. John's Church, Epsom, and taught a class of boys in the Sunday School 1916-17.

EGBERT CHARLES WILLIAM WINSLET, was reported missing at Gallipoli and officially presumed killed in action on 25th April 1915. He left England in 1912 and joined the Australian Imperial Forces when war was declared.

ARTHUR CHARLES ZANDER, was killed in action at Arras on the 9th April 1917.

THE CHURCH BELLS.

In 1919 an expert reported to the Vicar and Churchwardens that the old belfrey framework of wooden beams was insecure and that the eight bells ought to be re-cast. On the death of **Mrs. SOPHIA JANE WARREN** on the 26th Jan, 1920, her husband **Mr. ARTHUR JOHN WARREN** formerly for some years a Churchwarden, offered to have all the bells recast and rehung in her memory. Soon afterwards **Mrs. ISOBEL G. HARTER** promised two more bells in memory of her husband **Mr. ALFRED HARTER**. These offers were gratefully accepted by the Vicar and Churchwardens. The bells were dedicated by the Right Reverend **D^e Talbot** Bishop of Winchester.

**THE APPROACH ROAD-
-WAY.** **MRS. WARREN'S** brother,
MR. JAMES WALTER WILSON,

died on 17th January, 1920, and on the settlement of his estate Mr. Warren approached Mrs. Harter, suggesting that they should together purchase the Stoneleigh and Brewery Estate, he taking the house, and she using for purchase of the Brewery a sum of £1000, already placed by her at the Vicar's disposal for building purposes. Mr. Warren undertook to form a fund with the help of relations in Java and at home, to create a satisfactory full-width approach for the Church, after the removal of the wall and some of the Brewery buildings which masked the western front of the Church. This work was finished in—

August 1923. Photographs shewing old and new views are in the Vestry.

IN 1922 the three central lights of the East Window were inserted "In memory of **C.A.B.** 1874, **E.K.B.** 1884, **M.H.B.** 1885, and **E.G.** 1889," in accordance with the terms of the will of **HENRIETTA FLORENCE BULLER**, late of Down Hall, Epsom, who died on March 5th 1895 and left a legacy to be eventually applied to this purpose.

THE REVEREND
WALDEGRAVE DENT
BAINBRIDGE-BELL, M. A.

Camb., when newly ordained served curacies at Cheltenham and in London, and was for a while domestic chaplain to Bishop Thorold of Winchester. In 1891 he was appointed Vicar of Micheldever in Hampshire, going thence in 1897 to the vicarage of Thames Ditton. In 1904 he became Vicar of Epsom; and for the last twenty years of an active life wrought for **GOD** as the faithful incumbent of this parish. With many other Epsom men he did his part in the Great War, serving overseas as a ~

Chaplain to the Forces in the year 1916-17.
He died while about his Father's business
-ness 7th January, 1924.

He will live long in the affection of Epsom
folk as the inceptor of the Church House,
to which his friends and parishioners
gave the sum of £500 as a tribute to his
memory, and as the initiator of the re-
-building of the parish church of **St.**
Martin, of which he saw the completion
of the eastern arm and transepts.

A tablet, placed to his memory on the
north wall of the sanctuay, forms part
of the memorial of a devoted parish-
priest who left behind him a record of
devout service to **GOD** and of un-
-wearying ministration to the people
of this place.

D**URING** the year 1925 the Advowson of this ancient parish was purchased by **ARTHUR MOORE** Justice of the Peace of this county, and sometime Churchwarden of this parish, and by him presented to the Bishop of Winchester as a memorial to his late wife **LUCY MABEL MOORE** who died at Epsom on the first day of April, 1924. Thus the Bishop of the Diocese became the patron of the living of Epsom.

years in the Church, and for a great
part of that time he was a sidesman ∴
and took an active interest in all its ∴.

concerns. He died 19th of November 1921
The left hand light was given in loving
memory of **GORDON HARLEY** ∴
GRELLIER by his Mother, Brothers
and sisters. He was baptised in this
Church of which he was a member all ∴
his life and for some years a Sidesman.
He was killed 31st of October 1918 ∴
during the final advance in the Great
War at Poix du Nord in France and was
buried there.

The right hand light was given in loving
memory of **WILLIAM MORRIS**
VINCENT by his Widow (second
daughter of H.M. Grellier) his Father,
Mother, Brother and Sister. William
Morris Vincent was married in this
Church where he had worshipped for

many years. He was killed in the Great War while leading his men into action at the Battle of Gaza in Palestine 26th March 1917.

The Altar in the Morning Chapel with Red and Festal hangings together with the gilding was presented by ∴ Lady Reid in memory of

SIR MARSHALL FREDERICK REID, C.I.E. was closely associated with this Parish Church as a devout worshipper, a generous benefactor and a wise counsellor. To the building of the Church House he gave of his time of his wide experience, of his means. He passed from us on March 20th 1925 when "the King sent and delivered him."

A SILVER CHALICE & PATEN
with a small Replica for the use of
the sick, designed and executed by ∴ ∴
MISS BARBARA BANISTER
were given by **M^{RS} BANISTER**
in memory of her husband **FREDERICK**
BANISTER for many years Honorary
Treasurer for the day schools of this
Parish, who passed from mortal sight
on Christmas Morning, 1927.

T HE CLERGY & CHOIR STALLS
were presented by **M^R ROBERT**
BRADSHAW as a Thank Offering
for preservation in a serious accident.
Designed by **SIR CHARLES**
NICHOLSON, Bart. the architect
of this Church, they were dedicated on
All Saints Day, 1928, by the

RIGHT REVEREND BISHOP

RANDOLPH D.D. Dean of Salisbury
formerly Bishop Suffragan of Guildford
The Donor never lived to see his
generous gift, being taken from us on
May 9th 1928, leaving many in Epsom
to mourn the loss of a loyal friend . .
and generous benefactor.

THE ANCIENT FONT

T was placed in its present position
and the Baptistry with its Hangings,
Candlesticks, Flower Vases, dedicated
by the **LORD BISHOP OF**
GUILDFORD on December 8th . .
1929 being the Second Anniversary
of the death of **ERNEST**
TOZER JANSON a devout
worshipper and loyal Churchman, in

whose memory these gifts were given
by his wife and children.

THE GREAT REREDOS
a gift of three great benefactors
ISABEL HARTER

solemnly dedicated on Sunday January
18th 1931, by **D^r GREIG, LORD**

In the centre is the Figure of Christ
