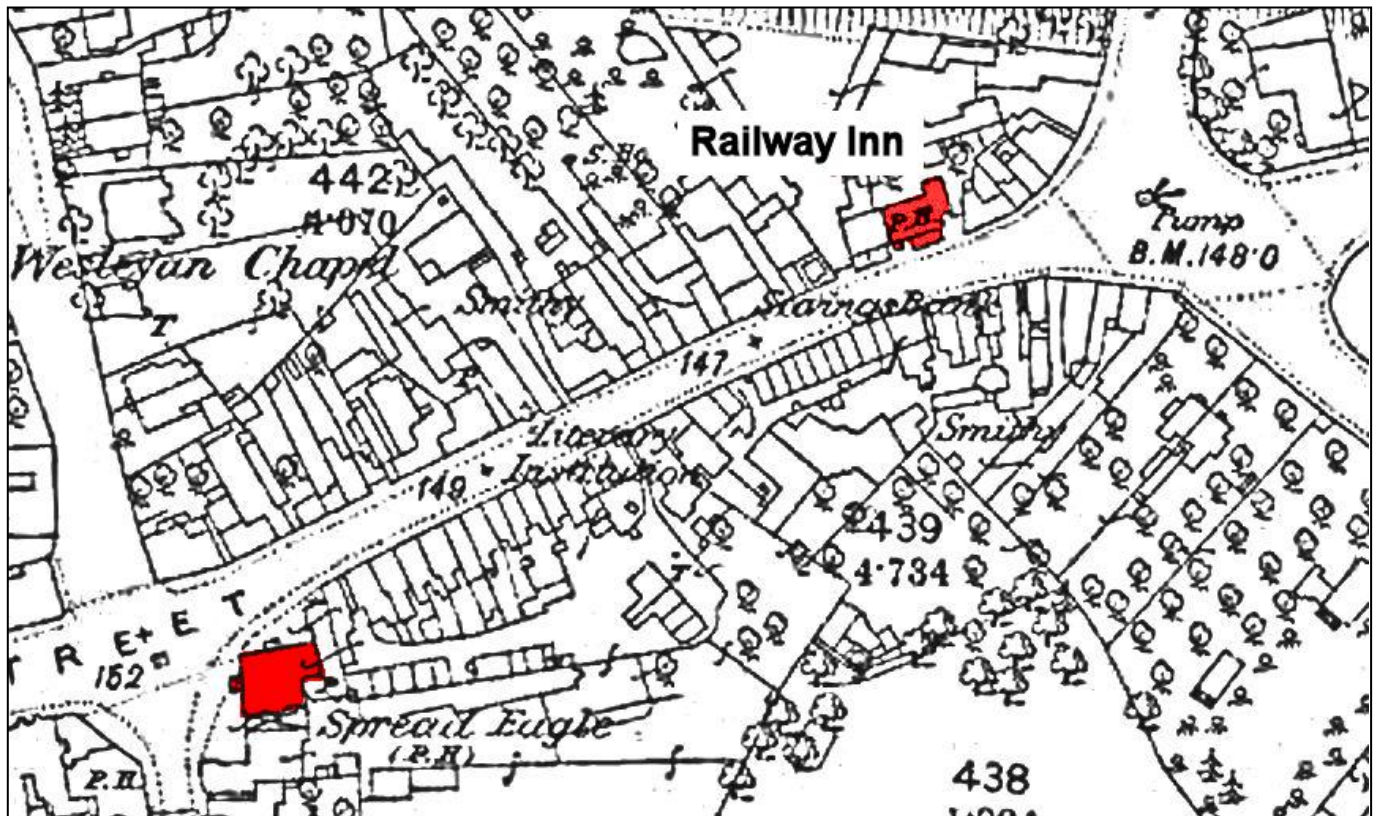
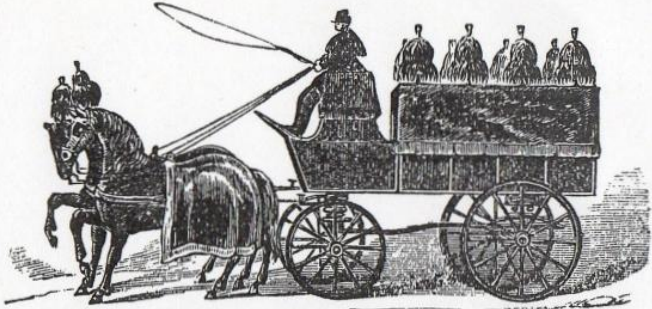


EPSOM HIGH STREET EAST, BUSINESSES 1861

Brief details of residential properties are included to assist in locating the businesses on the map. Properties follow the order on the 1861 census sheets (the street was not numbered in 1861, but numbers are shown below if known). It is not always clear whether individuals were operating their businesses from their home addresses.

Children (all born Epsom) – Adele Louise (1850-1931, unmarried, then living Burgh Heath Road); Maria Clara Guerin (1852-1928, unmarried, then living Burgh Heath Road); Horace Guerin (1853-1854); Frederic Augustus (1855-1906 Kingston district, publican, married Louisa Coridger Prescott); Edith Julia (1857-1860); Kate Fanny (1865-67).

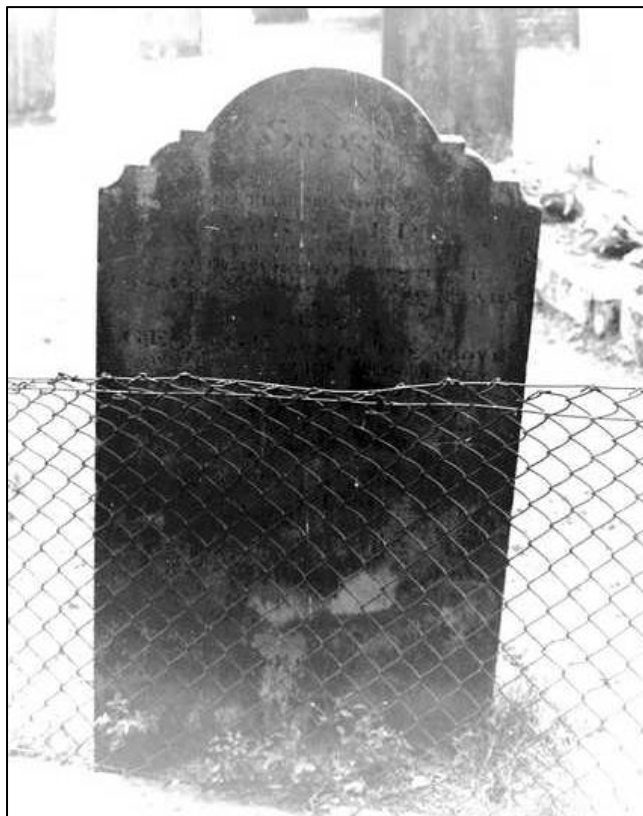

Nee Faulconer. Born c.1807 Slaugham, Sussex. Married 1832 miller and baker George Ede (died 1850). Died 6 May 1875. Paternal grandparents of Baron [Chuter-Ede](#) of Epsom via their son, James.

Children (all born Epsom) – Rebecca (1834-1899 Hounslow, married widowed retired veterinary surgeon William Coleman); Elizabeth (1838-95, married South Street grocer Charles Barton); James (1840-1921, grocer and baker, married Agnes Mary Chuter); Louisa (1843-1904 Chertsey district, married local grocer Arthur Spikesman); George (1846-9).

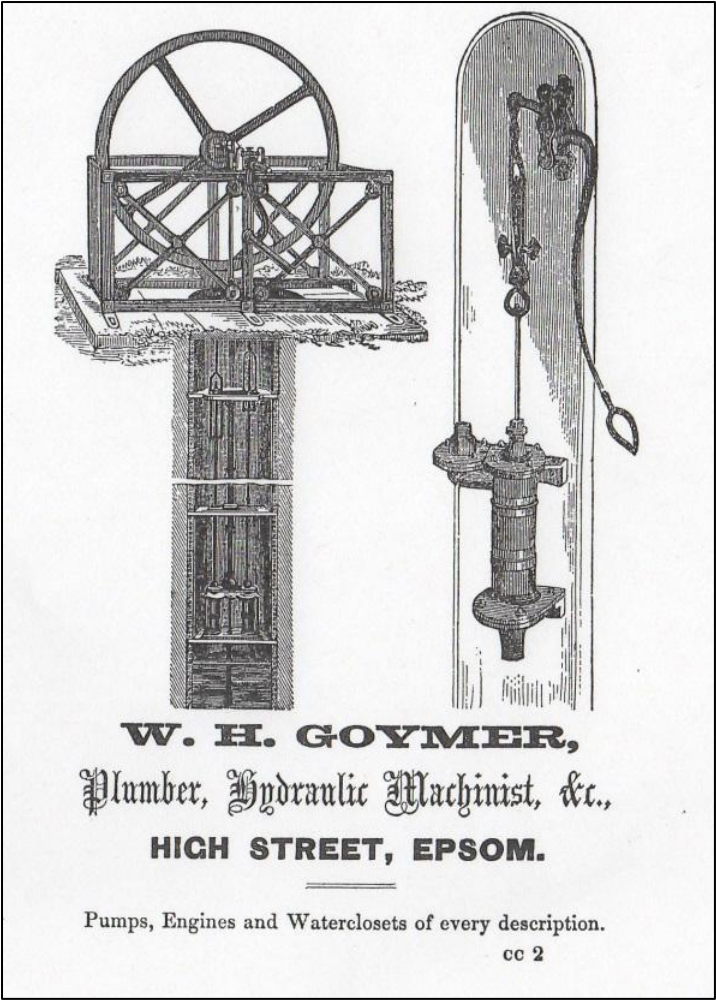
	John Wellings <i>Greengrocer</i>	Born c.1800 Chalfont, Bucks. Married Ann (c.1810 -92). Died 1877. Children – Sarah Ann (c.1840 Newtimber, Sussex, married James Butt); Frederick (c.1842 Newtimber); James (c.1843 Brighton); Charles (c.1846 Brighton); Harriet (c.1848 Brighton); Septimus (c.1850 Ashted, married Julia Randall). Formerly a butler.
	Thomas Humphrey <i>Butcher</i>	Born c.1828 Epsom. Married 1854 Sarah Butcher (c.1830 Womersley-1901). Son of local butcher John Humphrey. Died 5 March 1901, then living at Portland House, Ashley Road. Mr Humphrey had retired from butchering by 1871 and was the occupier of 18 acres in Epsom Common Fields.
	Septimus Coppinger <i>Tailor and hatter (later a beer retailer)</i>	Born 1828 Northiam, Sussex/Kent. Father, Thomas, kept the Six Bells Inn, Northiam. 1851: journeyman grocer in Northiam. Married 1851 Sarah (Sally) Roberts (born c.1827 Northiam). Brother of Henry Coppinger, who was landlord of the Railway Inn in 1861. Died 8 April 1870 Epsom. Children – Elizabeth (c.1852 Northiam-1927, married John Stacey Halsted); Charles (1854 Northiam, possibly emigrated to USA and died in 1902); Seymour (1856 Epsom-1858 Epsom, buried with his father in St Martin's Churchyard); Emily (1858 Epsom-1949?, married Thomas Prest); John (1864 Epsom, probably emigrated to USA). After Mr Coppinger's death Sarah carried on business as a milliner and dressmaker, later moving to Church Street; she then re-located to Ashted to live with her married daughter Emily. Sarah died in 1902. Grave of Septimus and Seymour Coppinger in St Martin's Churchyard.

	Frederick Mansell or Monsell <i>Shoemaker</i>	Probably an employee/residential
	Alfred John West <i>Bootmaker</i>	Born c.1821 Ireland. Married 1846 Hannah Crowhurst (c.1819 Battle, Sussex-1906?). By 1871 Mr West gave harness-making as his main trade and by 1881 the family had moved to Horley, where they remained. Died 10 February 1902, still in Horley. Children –Barbara Hannah (1848 Dorking-1930 Tunbridge Wells, married grainer Francis William Nugent); Alfred James (1850 Dorking-1929, boot repairer, married Lucy Sophia Frazer); James Longhurst (1856 Dorking, Bootmaker, married Annie Eliza Colson and Caroline Parker); Louisa Maria (1857 Guildford).
	Thomas Sharp <i>Coach builder</i>	Born c.1793 London. Married 1835? Jane Bunce? (c.1797 Claygate/Ditton). Child – Caroline Nicholls (1836 Sutton-1866 Devon, married engine driver Joseph Perkins).
	Mrs Louisa Walters <i>Widow</i>	Residential
	Charles Trulove <i>Labourer</i>	Residential
	John (actually Charles) Weatherall <i>Cordwainer (shoemaker)</i>	Born c.1791 Whitechapel. Married Elizabeth (c.1801 Sussex-1879 Epsom Union Workhouse, where she was a pauper inmate). Possibly died 1866. Children (all born Epsom) – Hannah (1821-1900, married groom William Nye); Samuel (1823, master baker, married Mary Mole and Susanna Smith); Thomas (1825-1843, groom, died of consumption in Epsom Union Workhouse); James (1827); Charles (1829-48, died of scrofula [usually tuberculosis] in Epsom Union Workhouse); John (1830-39); Emma (1832); William (1833, baker-1903?, married Amelia Ann Kirk); George (born and died 1835); Francis (1837-1917, baker). <i>Note: If anyone is intending to research this family, try alternative spellings of Weatherall!</i>
	Edmund Ansell <i>Hackney carriage driver</i>	Residential
	Kinsley Fearey <i>Blacksmith</i>	Born c.1804 Lincolnshire. Married 1828 Betsey Thompson (c.1805 Boston, Lincs-1866 Marylebone). Died 1868 Marylebone. Children – Robert (c.1834); Mildred (c.1841, married Richard Hole); Kinsley (1844 Marylebone, married Caroline Church).

	Miss Elizabeth Horley <i>Laundress</i>	Born 1784 Epsom. Died 7 September 1864 Epsom Union Workhouse. Daughter of local couple Richard and Ann Horley.
	Joseph Davies <i>Labourer</i>	Residential
	Richard Butcher <i>Painter and glazier</i>	Born c.1802 Epsom. Married Mary Ann Knight (c.1809 Tring, Hertfordshire-1878), a relative of the Andrews family. Died 1864. Children (all born Epsom) – Jane Elizabeth (1839-47); Frank (1841, master brickmaker/painter); Ann Knight (1844, married Ambrose Jolly); Edward Richard (1846-1900, labourer, married Hannah Lewis); Richard Thomas Craddock (1848-1909, bricklayer, married Ann).
	Mrs Ann Turner <i>Widow</i>	Residential
	Isaac Burton <i>Grocer</i>	Born c.1811 Clavering, Essex. Married 1841 widow Harriet Lamb (nee Handley, c.1797 Epsom). Moved to Hook. Mr Burton was a ginger beer manufacturer. Died 13 February 1889 Hook.
	John Steer <i>Cooper</i>	Born c.1803 Surrey. Married Elizabeth (c.1795 East Grinstead-possibly 1870 but certainly before 1871). Died 1873.
	Frederick Parfitt <i>Fishmonger and poulterer</i>	Born c.1822 Kingswood. Married 1850 Elizabeth Markby Dodd (1818-74, inmate of workhouse) and in 1874 married Charlotte Arbour (c.1835 Cranwick, Norfolk-1882), formerly the family's servant. Died 1893. Formerly a stationer. Children Epsom– Frederick (1851-?); Arthur (1853 Epsom-1863); Lewis (1858 Epsom); Frank Herbert Arbour (c.1868 London-1945, fishmonger, married Alice Cecil Pierce); Frederick (c.1876 Epsom).
	John unreadable <i>Labourer</i>	Residential
	Mrs Charlotte Anderson <i>Licensed hawker</i>	Born c.1804 Canterbury. Might have died in 1876 in Epsom Union Workhouse, but, if so, her age was significantly wrong in the 1861 census.
	Mrs Mary Elizabeth Lovelock <i>Laundress</i>	Nee Griffith. Born c.1806 Epsom? Married 1824 labourer James Lovelock (possibly died 1858). It looks as if Mr Lovelock had several spells in the Workhouse. Probably died 1865. Children (all born Epsom) - Henry Duke (c.1835); David (1842-1928, bricklayer, married Lucy); William (1845-81, gardener).

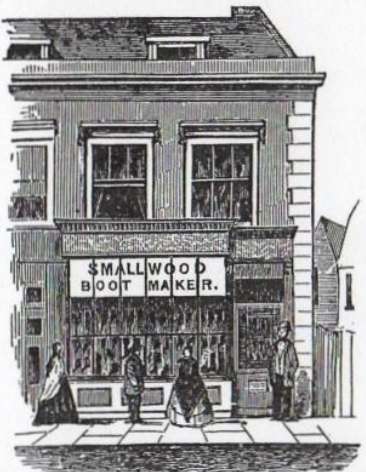

	Henry Clark <i>Carpenter</i>	Residential
	William Brewer <i>Labourer</i>	Residential
	Miss Amelia <i>Dressmaker</i> Miss Jane Ellis <i>Milliner</i> Miss Sophia Ellis <i>Milliner</i> Miss Clara Ellis <i>Dressmaker</i>	Amelia - born c.1809 Canterbury. Had retired by 1871 and was living with her brother-in law, High Street tailor Thomas Hulbert, and his family (see High Street West). By 1881 Amelia was living in Ealing, aged 72, with sister Clara, who had managed to put on a spurt and reach age 49 – see below). Died 1898? Unmarried. Jane – born 1814 Epsom. By 1871 Jane had moved to Framwellgate, Durham to live with sister Caroline. She remained with Caroline. Died 1900 Durham. Sophia – born 1819 Epsom. Married licensed victualler Mr Harvey, who died before 1881. Clara – born 1827 Epsom. By 1871 she was a barmaid in Gravesend, living with married sister Sophia (and they were getting even younger, with Sophia aged only 37 and Clara aged 31!). Died 1902 Ealing. Unmarried. Daughters of hatter Edward Ellis (died 1835) and Elizabeth (died 1851). Other children – Caroline (1810-98 Durham, married Peter Gradon); Emma (1816/19-65, married Thomas Hulbert).
	Charles Cronk <i>Bootmaker</i>	Born c.1827 Middlesex. Married 1846 Elizabeth Hardey (c.1825 Cobham) and then married in 1897 Jane Gregory (born c.1830). Had moved to London by 1871. Died 1909 Lewisham district.
	Mrs Sarah Frances Hales <i>Tobacconist (later sold toys)</i>	Nee Williams. Born c.1809 Holborn/Bloomsbury. Married 1843 bootmaker John Benton Hales (1806 Bermondsey-1873 Wandsworth district). Died 1874. Mr Hales was never at home in the censuses and I imagine that the couple had separated quite early in their marriage, although he appeared as the proprietor of this shop in an 1862 directory. Child – John (1849 Epsom-1932). See Epsom Businesses 1911
	Mrs Mary Ann Foulger <i>Shopkeeper</i>	Nee Spurling. Born c.1823 Great Bealings, Suffolk. Married 1845 coachman William Foulger (c.1821 Great Bealings-1858). Children (all born Epsom except the first) – Jane (c.1836 Suffolk – looks doubtful that she was a natural daughter, given her birthdate); Elizabeth Anne (1846, married bricklayer Edward Francis); George William (1847-1898 Greenwich district, railway signaller, married Eliza Norton); Arthur James (1849-56, buried Ewell); Thomas Charles (1851-1936) see Epsom Businesses 1911; Amelia Ann (1852-98, unmarried); Edward Henry (1854-6, buried Ewell); Walter John (1857-8).

	Charles Alexander <i>Labourer</i>	Residential
	William Apted <i>Fishmonger</i>	Born c.1821 Ewell. Married 1847 Sarah Eatten (c.1825 Shoreditch-1886). Died 1875. Had moved to Croydon by 1871 and by 1881 his widow was a lodging-house keeper there. Children (all born Epsom) - William (1848); James (1850-1886 Epsom, shoemaker); Sarah (1851-2); George Albert (1853-1888, fishmonger, married Alice Everett); Ellen/Helen (1855); Louisa (1857, married Charles Percy Williams and Edwin Thomas Brown – see Edwin Stanley Brown); Alfred (1859-1927 Croydon, boot seller, married Rose Hannah Carrick); Harry (1862-1919 Brighton, poulterer, married Kate Card).
	John Drew <i>Bootmaker</i>	Born c.1823 Kent. Married 1849 Margaret Wetten (c.1820 Epsom-1888?). Died 1863 Epsom. In 1881 Margaret Senior and daughter Lucy were working together as servants to farmer Thomas Coote in Ewell. Children (all born Epsom) – Margaret (1849-1934?, married groom John Thrower); Elizabeth (1851 – had daughter, Alice Gearey Drew, 1868-9); Emily (1852-76, unmarried); John Thomas (1854, agricultural labourer, married Sarah); Harriet Camilla (1857-61); George William (1859-December 1912, coachman and finally landlord of the Railway Tavern in Chartham, Kent; married Elizabeth Tubby Briggs [died 1908] and in 1910 Charlotte Ditton Wellsted [died 1912]); Lucy Margery Ann (1862).
	William Wallis <i>General dealer</i>	Born 1827 Bloomsbury. Married 1847 Sarah Elizabeth Harris [probably died 1856] and then Mary Ann (c.1838 Norwood). Formerly a smith and later described as a broker. I am not absolutely convinced that he was married to Mary Ann. He resurfaced in 1881, still a general dealer, living in Westminster with a wife called Clara (born c.1830 Bishopsgate) and William Junior was with them. After that I cannot find Mr and Mrs Wallis. William Junior seems to have lived with his sister and her family for some years. Children – William Henry (1850 Mitcham-1906 Whitechapel, labourer); Sarah Elizabeth (1852 Mitcham-1923 Edmonton, married ivory turner Harbut Wallis). Nothing further known.
	Josiah Lowe <i>Crape (sic) dyer and finisher</i>	Later moved to East Street. Born c.1806 Goswell Road, Middx [Islington/Clerkenwell]). Married Louisa (c.1803 Whitechapel) and then in 1857 married Mary Ann Sparks (c.1807 Leytonstone-1893 Epsom). Died 1876 Epsom. Children* (born Islington) – Helen (c.1829); Rosa (c.1824); Walter (c.1836); Albert (c.1840). <i>*There may well be more but the available christening records do not show sufficient information to be sure.</i>

Born c.1826 Balby, Yorkshire. Married *Ann (c.1827 Farringdon, Berkshire-1912 Brighton district). Something seems to have gone awry with the Smallwoods. William Leonard had three intermittent admissions to Epsom Union Workhouse and Joseph was in there in 1889 and then taken to Brookwood Asylum – he seems to have died in 1894 in Guildford district (which probably means that he was still in Brookwood, having been there in 1891, described as a lunatic). Mrs Smallwood was living in Hove by 1881 and remained there, ultimately living in just one room.

Children (all born Epsom) – Ann (1852); Sarah Emily (1853, married Ernest Ford?); William Leonard (c.1855-1927 Fulham, shoemaker, married Louisa Burton Gurney); Frederick Collett (1860-63); Charles Henry (1862-1936 Essex, married Ada Ellen Crawford); Joseph Edgar (1864-1939 Hove, Bootmaker, married Rosina Matilda Miles); Thomas Reginald (1865-1931 Brighton district, house painter, married Sabina Hider); Ernest Alfred (1868, boot shopkeeper, married Louise McGuire [died 1901] and Clara Elizabeth Hall); Harry Benjamin [aka Benjamin Henry] (1870-1931?, carpenter, married Emily Roseina Bashford).

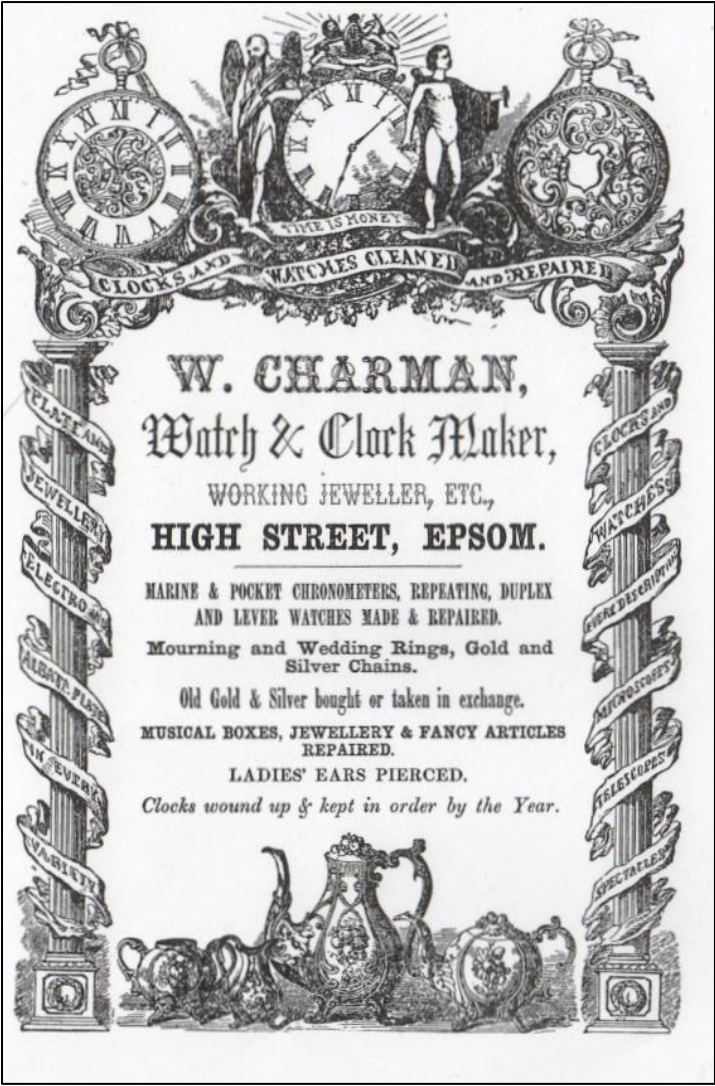

Children (both born Epsom) – Ellen (1849, married watchmaker Edwin Green); Elizabeth Alice (1851-1918, married Cheam grocer Henry Norrington).
	James Boorer <i>Pork butcher</i>	Born c.1800 Sutton. Married Maria (c.1803 Sutton-1858) and in 1861 married Ann Bonner (c.1808 Hampton Wick-1892 Newark, Nottinghamshire, where she had lived with her sister for many years). Died 1862? Children – Maria Ann (c.1838 Sutton); Richard Barnes (1839 Sutton-1899 Croydon district, butcher, married Isabella Peters Price).
	Thomas Maybank <i>Journeyman painter</i>	Probably residential – did not appear in the commercial section of directories.

Children – Mary Ann (1830 Sutton); Charles Thomas (1846 Epsom, coachman); James Frederick (1850 Epsom-1924 Brentford district, married Jane Banister); George Sidney (1853, laundryman, married Sarah Weston).

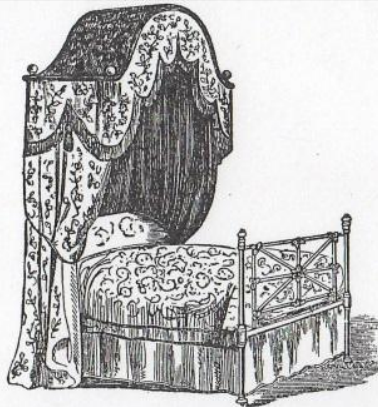
