I got as far as Lambeth Bridge and a woman called to me asking if I would like to go along with her as she had a torch. I just about saw her and we both walked together. I eventually arrived near my home and having thanked this woman I suddenly heard my mother shouting my name, "Enrica, where are you?" and she must have got a shock when I replied. I hope this will be of interest. In 4 years of war I had quite a lot of awful experiences but I survived!



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
