November 30th 1786

Thursday last was married, at Ewell, in Surry, Mr. Stevens, mealman and malster, at Kingston, to Miss Judd, daughter of Mr. Judd, proprietor of the flour and paper mills at Ewell.

January 2nd 1787

Early on Monday morning, as Mr. Norbury of Ewell in Surry, was going from Ewell to Kingston, on horseback, he was stopped near the Powder Mill by two footpads, who robbed him of a guinea, some silver, and a brace of pheasants.
